This year's proposed budget includes a 2.53% increase over last year's. For context, the six-year average increase, including this year, is 2.89%.

Throughout the budget process, our focus has remained steadfast: preserve and enhance educational opportunities for all students. The proposed budget continues all current programs and maintains full support for extracurricular activities which continue to thrive!

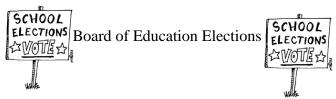
Programs like our elementary ski program have grown significantly, and with Gore Mountain right in our backyard, it just makes sense to get students skiing and snowboarding.

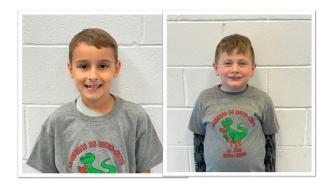

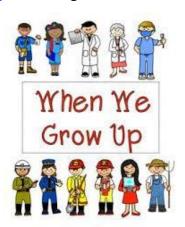

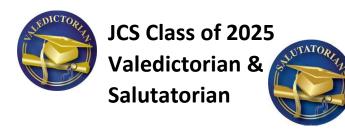

1. Crary Education Fund Scholarship

- This renewable scholarship valued up to \$1,300 is for a high school senior living in Clinton, Essex, Franklin, Hamilton, or Warren County who will be enrolling in a vocational program or college. The adjusted gross family income cannot exceed \$90,000. Exceptions to surpassing this limit will be considered but must be justified in writing by providing specific information on the number of children in the household, the number attending college, or any unusual financial circumstances

The deadline to submit your application is Tuesday, May 6, 2025.

2. The North Creek Rotary Club Scholarship – This is a \$1,000 scholarship for a senior who:

3. The North Creek Railway Depot Museum Scholarship – This is a \$1,000 scholarship awarded to a graduating senior continuing their education/technical training in a post-secondary program or institution. The eligibility includes:

- volunteering in the community and an interest in the history of their local community
- c. student must accepted to a college or university; 2 or 4-year, or vocational school upon graduation in June 2025.

4. Excelsior Scholarship – This scholarship covers tuition for students attending a SUNY or CUNY college. Families whose adjusted combined federal household income is \$125,000 or less in the 2023 tax year are eligible to apply. Other pertinent criteria are on the website. You can submit your email or cell phone number to be alerted when the online application opens for fall 2025 applications.

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of Johnsburg Central School District, Towns of Johnsburg, Chester and Thurman, in the County of Warren, New York, be and hereby is authorized to expend the sum of \$13,219,898 and to levy the necessary tax therefor during the 2025-2026 school year.



Board Members

Peter Olesheski: Hello, my name is Peter Olesheski and I am a 2000 graduate of Johnsburg Central School. After high school, I attended Clarkson University before beginning a career in outdoor education and recreation. I currently serve as the Director of Public Property & Programs for the Town of Johnsburg. In addition to overseeing our youth and senior programming, my department is also responsible for the maintenance of our Town buildings, parks, cemeteries, sidewalks and Transfer Station. In addition to my full-time job, I previously served the community as a member of the Johnsburg Town Board for 9 years and have spent nearly 20 years volunteering, officiating and coaching high school sports at JCS. I currently lead several local non-profit groups including the Johnsburg Youth Committee, Johnsburg Youth Athletics and the Johnsburg Jr Outdoor Club. As the proud father of 4 children who are currently enrolled at JCS, I am very concerned about the future of our district. I believe that my professional experience and civic background make me an ideal candidate for the Johnsburg school board.
